#### The poker world

- Great social outlet
  - Lots of home games popular around the world
- Fun hobby for competitive people
  - Lots of tournaments of all sizes
    - Get on ESPN!
  - Cash games at all stakes
- Meet all kinds of people
  - Same table might have Fortune 50 CEO and a brick layer
- See and play with celebrities at the WSOP
- The Chris Moneymaker story
- Dark side
  - Addictive
  - Even great players go on losing streaks
  - Some people playing beyond their financial means
  - Sometimes brings out the worst in people



#### Be the house

- Casinos win by having an edge
  - Blackjack: you bust before the dealer goes
  - Craps: best you can do is slightly below even
- Even a slight edge works in favor of the house
- Law of large numbers
- Goal in poker
  - Be the house
  - Get into situations where you have the edge
  - You will lose sometimes when favored
    - But in the long run if you have an edge, you will win

- Bad beat
  - Life Pro Tip: Bad beat stories are much more fun to tell than to listen to

#### POKER HAND RANKINGS



#### Texas Holdem

- Each player dealt 2 cards face down
  - Betting round #1
- Three community cards dealt face up (flop)
  - Betting round #2
- One community card dealt face up (turn)
  - Betting round #3
- One community card dealt face up (river)
  - Betting round #4
- Players hand is best 5 cards from 2 private and 5 community cards

### Two types of big straight draws

- Double belly buster:
  - When two different cards give you a straight using different board cards
- You have **I I I I** and the flop is **I I I I I**
- There are two card ranks (8 cards) that give you a straight
  - Any 4 and any 8
- This will be well disguised if you hit
- Contrast to open-ended straight draw



and the flop is



#### Cool (and useful) facts

- You cannot make a full house or better without a pair on the board
- You cannot make a flush without 3 to a suit on the board
- Straights are a little tricky to identify few unpaired boards can't have a straight
- You can't have a straight without a 5 or a 10
- Bottom two pair is a vulnerable hand if a higher card pairs on the board, you are counterfeited.

## Setup

- One player is the "button" or the "dealer"
- To the left of the button is the small blind
- To the left of the small blind is the big blind
- Forced bet pre-flop
  - Small blind posts a small bet
  - Big blind posts a big bet
- For example, if the stakes are 1-3
  - Small bet is \$1
  - Big bet is \$3
- To the left of the big blind is Under the Gun (UTG) and acts first
- Minimum bet is a big blind
- Minimum raise is the amount of the previous bet or raise



## Blind Straddles

- Only in cash games
- Under the gun can post
  - Usually double the big blind
  - Straddle is "live"
- Mississippi straddle
  - From any position
  - Position gets priority
  - 2-5 times the big blind
- Generates action & raises stakes



### Chip stacks

- Each player has a certain number of chips on the table
- Effective stack
  - You can only bet the chips in your stack.
  - Player A has 1,500; Player B has 800; Player C has 2,300
    - If they go all in, then player B can only win 1,600
  - Side pots
    - If all 3 players go all in, and player B has the best hand, player A has second best hand
      - Player B wins pot of 2,400 (including his original 800)
      - Player A win "Side Pot" of 1,400
      - Player C gets back 800
- Often refer to a stack as the number of big blinds























### Chess vs. Poker

- In chess, the best player almost always wins
  - In poker the best player will win more often than the worst player
- In chess, the worst player will grow frustrated and quit
  - In poker, a bad player will win big sometimes and keep coming back
- In the world championship of chess, only the top handful of players compete
  - In poker, any donkey with \$10k can play in the World Series Main Event
- Playing chess well is hard
  - Playing poker well is also hard! (and it's easy to play badly and not realize it)

### Cash versus tournaments

- Cash games
  - Chip values = cash value
  - Blinds stay the same
  - Can add chips to stack up to the maximum anytime
  - Take any available seat
  - Can never remove chips from the table
  - Can take breaks anytime
  - Straddles usually allowed
  - Running multiple boards out
  - Stacks tend to be large
    - Relative to big blind

- Tournaments
  - Chips have no real value
  - Blinds go up regularly
    - So stack size goes down relative to big blind value
  - Game is on the clock
  - Assigned seating
  - Cannot add chips
  - Top # of places get paid, e.g. top 10-15% of the field
  - You can only lose your buy-in
  - Different formats:
    - Bounties
    - Shootouts
    - Satellites

### House cut – the rake

- Cash games in casinos
  - Rake each pot
  - Usually 5% up to \$5
    - Same for \$1 \$3 and \$2 \$5
  - Typically \$5 \$10 and above is timed rake
    - Every half hour, each player pays a big blind
  - Tip to dealer is expected from winner of each hand
  - Many places take additional \$1 or \$2 for bad beat jackpot and high hand promotions
- Tournaments
  - Part of buy-in goes to house
  - E.g. \$100 buy-in, \$15 goes to house, \$85 goes to prize pool
  - Players who cash are expected to tip based on how much they win
